- The votes of 2,200 NGOs awarded us the prize: "Outstanding Achievement Award", for our contribution to the prevention of sexual abuse at a global level (The Commission on Human Rights, 2022).
- At Harvard University, we received the "Global Success Story" recognition by the No More Global Foundation, due to the impact of our work in the region (2019).

Sexual violence is a priority problem!

In Latin America 40 million children under the age
of 15 suffer from violence.

Studies show that 7 girls are raped daily in Ecuador.

85% of cases of sexual abuse are NOT reported and only 5% obtain a legal sentence.

The risk of being a victim of sexual abuse is 4 to 10 times greater for a Girl, Boy or Adolescent with a disability.
